required of Council for its good governance. The AGM also looked at a possible new Strategic plan.

Report on VCC AGM held 1st June 2019.

The 2019 AGM was held at St Verena and St Blshoy's Coptic Church in Melbourne's CBD.

The day was particularly satisfying with numbers strong (approx. 60) and good diversity of denominations present, the engagement of participants was good. All experienced a variety of input from the experience of Coptic Matins to the keynote by the Indigenous clergyman, Rev Glenn Loughrey. The participants also engaged in discussions around future directions of Council.

The business side of AGM: i. the constitutional changes were accepted

- ii. financials and budget accepted
- iii. Standing Committee was elected
- iv. VCC needs to discover a Treasurer
- v. Rev Ian Smith, Executive Officer, presented further work on the strategic plan which was well received - refocus on revitalising of Council via engagement with member Churches.

A vote of Thanks was given to the three retiring members of Standing Committee who have given tremendous service to the Council. Mr Ashok Jacob and Ps Gordon Wegener, both served as Presidents, while Mr Gavin Faichney has served on the reference group for VCCEM, Living Faiths Commission as well as on local ecumenical council support.

The Council releases Bishop Peter Danaher (Anglican) after two years of Presidency and Installed the Rev Fr Shenouda Boutros (Coptic) as the new President of VCC. A good contingent of Coptic clergy were present to both participate in service and support Fr Shenouda.

The Standing Committee held a brief meeting post AGM – a welcome was given to the Rev Denise Liersch (Moderator Elect, UCA) who has joined Standing Committee.



Loneliness: Australia's next health crisis?

An Australian psychological journal last year suggested loneliness could be Australia's next public health crisis. Loneliness is defined as being disconnected from others and seeing one's relationships negatively, so one can be lonely while surrounded by people.

The horrifying rate of youth suicide is partly connected to loneliness.

What can the churches do to help, or what can we all do as individuals? WCC pays tribute to ecumenist pioneer

On Monday 3 June the WCC hosts a half-day seminar on the legacy of one of ecumenism's leading figures, archishop Nathan Söderblom, followed by a discussion on today's ecumenical challenges.



Hostilities in Gaza 'morally and ethically untenable,' religious leaders state

On 8 May, the WCC, Middle East Council of Churches, and ACT Alliance released a message expressing deep concern over the latest hostilities in the Gaza Strip, describing the present situation as "morally and ethically untenable." Last weekend, the region near the Israel-Gaza border saw the most intense escalation of violence since the 2014 war.



"Human peace chain" reflects the wish of the people on Korean Peninsula

On 27 April, some 500,000 people joined hands to form a "human peace chain" along the 500 km long Demilitarized Zone between South and North Korea. They expressed their strong desire for permanent peace in the Korean Peninsula, gathering to celebrate the first anniversary of Panmunjom Declaration and commemorate the centennial of the 1 March Independence Movement.

Purpose of the Gathering

"promote and provide gospel-based Peace and Nonviolence resources to all Christian educational systems and secondary schools in Australia and New Zealand by 2021"

At this gathering participants will be invited to...

- learn about peace and nonviolence education
- reflect on how the Gospel inspires the work for nonviolence
- network with other educators/teachers
- explore and share resources and experiences to assist with embedding nonviolence principles in curriculum and practice
- contribute to the overall purpose described above

Background

During 2018 a group of keen educators and peace-practitioners from Australia and New Zealand, mainly from the Anglican and Catholic traditions, met to discuss, develop resources and teach the 'theology and practice of peace and nonviolence' in Christian schools. This included the development of a pilot senior-school Religious Education unit by the Anglican Schools Commission (WA) and the incorporation of nonviolence principles, and content, in a number of Catholic education systems and schools.

The feedback from students and staff has been very positive, with teachers observing the helpful holistic nature of the material, which can engage students at intellectual/theological, spiritual/prayerful, and practical (nonviolent peacemaking) levels.

The Gathering

- identify and reflect on connections between the inner (life) and the outer(practices) of nonviolence

This day can be missed if a participant did it on another occasion. This day can also be done as a 'stand-alone' for teachers who would like to know more about Jesus and Nonviolence, but who cannot attend the full three-day gathering.

Thursday 15th August (9am – 4.30pm) – a day of sharing ideas, resources and stories from teachers/practitioners who have been experimenting with the curriculum resources during 2018. This is likely to include content/resource sharing on:

- the Theology of Nonviolence, particularly focussing on the work of Rene Girard and his other Christian interpreters
- the Practice of Prayer as a way of supporting nonviolent peace-making
- stories about how students are beginning to engage in practical ways

Friday 16th August (9am to 2pm) – A self-organising Open Space day for participants to engage with what has been emerging during the preceding two days, share resources, and plan practical next steps in their respective contexts.


